

The Calhoun Road (AX) is also a handy route to use; it crosses Observatory Rd.

There is no bus service in that area, so everyone must arrange his own transportation. 

Mr. Herbert W. Cornell, a founder member of this society, has again produced his astronomical guide. The 1966 edition will be available at Friday's meeting for our members. This compilation is really a monumental piece of work requiring several months to accomplish and is very special for its mathematical calculation and research some features of which cannot be found elsewhere. For example, Mr. Cornell has figured the times when various planets get up to, or down to, 20° altitude which is needed for good observation. Rising and setting times are all right for sun and moon, but planets cannot be observed when they are close to the horizon. Judging by the demand for this guide, it must be very useful to a great many people, and we are all very grateful to Mr. Cornell for his work.




