Our speaker for this evening will be Dr. Charles Cowley from Yerkes Observatory. He will talk on astronomical discoveries.




Mr. Michael Petrilak, jr., instructor of astronomy at UWM, will give a talk on "Cosmological Theories and the Extent of the Universe"


MORK PARTY at our observatory SATURDAY, APRIL 18th

Our main speaker, Tom Pope, a professional photographer, will talk on some material from a five-part paper which he and another of our members, Tom Osypowski, prepared and submitted to SKY and TELESCOPE. This paper deals with the proper requirements for high resolution lumar and planetary photography. Both men have made slides (using the 12-inch at our observatory) which will be used to illustrate the talk.

As a second feature, a camera hobbylet, Hassl Pestalozzi, will show pictures of the 200-inch Hale telescope and the 45-inch Schmidt camera at Mt. Palomar Observatory, and also pictures of galaxies and other deep-sky objects made with the Schmidt camera.

This program will be of some help to those people who want to begin in this field. Advanced emateurs can also expect to get something out of it, too, for refinements of film selection and processing will be discussed.

(unless, of course, tests of the ultra-violet satellite take him out of town - in which case - he will send us another spokesman)


A movie on the construction and functioning of this satellite will be shown. This observatory is designed to make ultra violet observations of stars.
